Keynote Speaker



Dr. Rosemarie Allen, Associate Professor in the School of Education at Metropolitan State University of Denver, President & CEO Institute for Racial Equity & Excellence

Dr. Rosemarie Allen has served as a leader in early childhood education for over 35 years. Her life's work is centered on ensuring children have access to high quality early childhood programs that are developmentally and culturally appropriate. She is currently an Assistant Professor in the School of Education at Metropolitan State University of Denver. Her classes are focused on ensuring teachers are aware of how issues of equity, privilege, and power impact teaching practices. Rosemarie has served in directorship roles with the Colorado Department of Human Services where she was responsible for the State's child care licensing program, the federal child care assistance program, the redesign of the State's quality rating and improvement system, the implementation of the State's professional development plan, and assisted in the creation of Colorado's early learning guidelines. Rosemarie serves on the Pyramid Equity Program, is a respected keynote speaker, and has the distinct honor of being appointed as a "Global Leader" to represent the United States at World Conferences across the globe.

Dr. Allen recently launched a new non-profit; Institute for Racial Equity & Excellence (IREE) which serves as the lead agency for ensuring equity in educational practices throughout the nation. July 2016, IREE was awarded a 1.5 million-dollar contract to monitor and license child care centers using a model she created, "Culturally Responsive Community Based Licensing". Rosemarie also served on President Obama's "My Brother's Keeper" (MBK) initiative, Early Childhood Task Force. In that role, she was the national expert on implicit bias and culturally responsive practices, speaking at conferences across the country. She also created a course for MBK which was distributed nationally in efforts to reduce and ultimately eliminate preschool suspensions.

Rosemarie earned her B. A. from California State University, Masters of Education from Lesley University and Doctorate Degree in Leadership for Equity in Education from the University of Colorado, Denver.

Workshops

A. <u>How to Engage Families that are Under-Represented</u> (AM Session Only) Dr. Rosemarie Allen, Associate Professor in the School of Education at Metropolitan State University of Denver, President & CEO Institute for Racial Equity & Excellence

Research shows that high quality early childhood and family engagement improves outcomes for the most vulnerable children. This workshop will provide strategies for engaging families that are under-represented, who appear 'invisible' and those who may be reluctant to accept and receive services. Information on challenges families face in accessing services will be included as well as information on the role of implicit bias, trauma, and culturally responsive practices in connecting with these families.

B. <u>Implicit Biases in Early Childhood Settings</u> (AM Session Only) Dr. Walter Gilliam, PhD, Director of The Edward Zigler Center in Child Development and Social Policy and Professor of Child Psychiatry and Psychology, Yale University

This presentation will discuss the latest findings regarding preschool expulsion and suspension, gender and racial disproportionality, and potential causes for disparities, including bias. The presentation will focus on research findings, how early educators understand implicit bias, and preschool expulsions/suspensions within a social justice and civil rights framework.

C. <u>Self-Care For Those Who Give</u> (PM Session Only)

D'Lisa Ramsey Worthy, M.Ed., Co-Director Center of Excellence in Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health, University of Maryland, School of Medicine, Department of Psychiatry

This workshop talks about self-care and how to plan to take time to care for yourself. It will include self-care strategies and self-care exercises.

D. <u>Social Emotional Strategies for Young Children</u> (PM Session Only) Anna Simulis, Early Childhood Behavioral Health Coach, Worcester County

In this workshop, providers will delve more deeply into understanding, preventing and planning responses to challenging behaviors in young children through the use of teaching appropriate social emotional skills. This workshop will focus on how the adults in the room are the key factor in teaching those replacement skills which can dramatically reduce suspension and expulsion. This training is geared towards parents, clinicians, child care providers and teachers of young children through elementary school.

E. Introduction to Language-Focused Family Engagement

Lorena Mancilla, Ph.D., Director of Early Years, WIDA

This interactive workshop introduces participants to language-focused family engagement. This unique approach to family engagement centers firmly on multilingual learners and their families by drawing attention to language learning and development that occurs both in-and-out of school. Participants will explore and discuss the need to integrate the fields of language education and family engagement to better support multilingual learners and their families.

F. <u>A Call to Action: A Vision for Equity and Excellence for Families and Children</u> Room: A303 Petrea J. Hicks, Early Childhood Specialist, XYZ, The End Result LLC Childhood Training

In this workshop, participants will review important historic events of equity that shaped American education and society. Economic inequality will be recognized as a problem that affects all racial and ethnic groups and how to support parents and families to advance their own interests through education and advocacy. Small group discussions and collaborative learning include strategies to strengthen family's abilities to foster long-term change through experiences that support their parenting, careers, and life goals.

G. Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs)

Naketta Lowery, CEO, Sustainable Life Solutions LLC

This workshop will provide an opportunity for participants to learn how Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) are traumatic events that occur in a child's life such as physical or sexual abuse, neglect, household dysfunction or witnessing violence. Research has shown that these types of experiences have a direct impact on children's developing brains and the immune system, increasing the risk for negative health and well-being outcomes as an adult. Adverse childhood experiences are common and cut across demographics such as income level, race, and culture. This presentation will provide participants with an in-depth look at the neurological impact of ACEs on health and well-being, as well as explore factors that increase resiliency. Participants will leave with a deeper understanding of ACES & what it means to help build & support resilient self-healing communities.

H. <u>Dismantling Privilege and Structural Racism: How Implicit Bias and Privilege Affect Our</u> <u>Interactions with Families</u> Room: A306

Karmen Rouland, Associate Director of Technical Assistance & Training, Mid-Atlantic Equity Consortium (MAEC), Center for Education Equity and Dr. Heather Tomlinson, Senior Specialist, Early Childhood and Family Engagement, Mid-Atlantic Equity Consortium (MAEC), Center for Education Equity

In this workshop, participants will learn how culturally responsive family engagement leads to positive outcomes for children and families. As practitioners, it is important to consider the many ways in which our own identity and experiences shapes the way we interact with and engage with families and our students. In this workshop, participants will explore the meanings of implicit bias and privilege. Participants will identify the ways in which bias is shaped and its interconnectedness with power and structural racism. We will discuss what this means for families and how we can use our own agency to improve the structures that often times serve as barriers to families. We will examine our practice and develop best practices for working with families.

The use of positive feedback and consequences toward different children in unequal amounts develops a child's perception of self-worth and ability. Participants will engage in several activities that will prompt them to reflect upon their interactions with children and caregivers from the lens of equity, and gain the tools to help build a more equitable environment for all.

J. <u>Music, Movement and Learning: Building Muscles in Young Brains!</u> Room: A300 Dr. Mike Longoria, Ph.D. (A.K.A. Dr. Mike), Early Childhood Consultant, Curriculum Developer

In this workshop, participants will learn how music and movement are powerful multi-sensory experiences that make learning fun and exciting for **ALL** children. This meaningful approach accelerates learning and promotes long term retention while developing school readiness, literacy skills, and knowledge and understanding in other academic areas. Furthermore, music and movement creates neural pathways which is critical in preparing young children for reading. Altogether, music and movement brings JOY to education!
